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

## President's Address

#### Dear Members,

I am indeed privileged to welcome you to the 11<sup>th</sup> Annual General Body Meeting of the Global Compact Network India. Today, during this AGM we will also have the opportunity to meet the new governing council members, who have assumed position post the recent elections.

With the Millennium Development Goals coming to an end this year, the UN Secretary General with support of a high level panel, which included UNGC, drafted a set of 17 goals aimed at creating a new global development framework beyond 2015. I am pleased to inform you that UN's pragmatism and visionary approach finds resonance in the new Sustainable Development Goals that integrates the three 'interdependent and mutually reinforcing pillars' of economic, environment and social indicators for ensuring holistic and sustainable development.

Today India's dynamic environment, also poses tremendous potential for the country to contribute towards the global sustainability agenda. The ball has started rolling and India has begun the process of transforming its economy from an economic growth center to a holistic economy addressing different contours of development. In the past few years, India has recorded high economic growth across sectors the implications of this economic growth lies on the massive urban expansion of the Indian cities. Its economy has been able to effectively build itself back after the recent economic crisis. The government has also raised investments, drafted legislations and is encouraging public private partnerships to deliver citizens' high quality life.

Against this background, GCNI has been instrumental in forwarding the Indian perspective and supporting the development of these sustainable development goals by being a member of the Secretary General's High level Panel. The past year witnessed attempts made by GCNI to put forth the stand of the Indian Companies and organisations firmly through programmatic interventions, cutting edge research and publications and networking on post 2015 agenda.

GCNI during the past one year, engaged meaningfully with various stakeholders such as Ernest & Young, Trace International, ACC, Novozymes, Aide-et-Action and various UN bodies including UNGC, UNESCAP for high level consultation for the post-2015 development agenda. The past year was full of achievements which would provide us with a strong and effective platform for the coming years.

#### Allow me to present major activities of GCNI in the past year:

The 10th National Convention organised on 14<sup>th</sup> February 2015, was one of the major events of the past year. The Convention organised at ITC Windsor in Bengaluru achieved some path breaking results. Centred around the theme 'Sustainable Transformation for India: 2015 & Beyond', the conference was inaugurated by Dr. Bhaskar Chatterjee, and was attended by about 300 participants including CEOs of large and leading public and private sector companies. It was well covered by leading national and international media. The major highlights of the event were the launch of the publication titled 'Sustainability Practices: Perspectives and Insights from Leading Indian and Global Businesses' comprising case studies of leading 19 businesses operating in India and Global Compact Awards. I am pleased to update that the 10th National Convention was made Carbon Neutral through an offset project that promoted biogas plant for cooking in rural households in lieu to scarce wood as primary fuel.

GCNI, as a curtain raiser for its 10<sup>th</sup> National Convention organised a Special Lecture by Dr. Shamshad Akhtar, United Nations Under-Secretary-General and Executive Secretary, United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (UN ESCAP) on 'Sustainable Development Goals and India: 2015 and Beyond' on 4<sup>th</sup> February, 2015. The lecture was attended by 150 participants, including business leaders, academic institutions, civil society organisations and bi-lateral and multi-lateral agencies and the UN systems. In her lecture Dr. Akhtar stressed on the leadership role that India can assume with regard to sustainable development.

The 5<sup>th</sup> Subir Raha Memorial Lecture was organised on the theme 'Good Corporate Governance' on 10<sup>th</sup> March 2015. The lecture was delivered by Dr. Anil Kakodkar, Former Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and INAE Satish Dhawan Chair of Engineering Eminence. In his address Dr. Kakodkar reiterated the importance of education as a step towards development and empowerment of society and stressed on the importance of innovation as an important factor in transforming an idea into a positive developmental outcome. The lecture was well attended by more than 250 participants.

The past year also witnessed the launch of our sixth local chapter in Pune on 27<sup>th</sup> February 2015. The Pune chapter was launched by Parag Satpute, Country Manager, Sandvik Asia and Christina Båge-Friborg, Head - Sustainable Business, Sandvik AB. With this sixth local chapter in Pune, GCNI has begun its advent into tier two city of India for promoting the uptake of UNGC principles among key stakeholders across the country.

As globally UN including UNGC is moving towards formulating a new development agenda, GCNI is also working towards streamlining itself with the new global architecture. On 15<sup>th</sup> December 2014, GCNI organised the strategic planning meeting to build on the gains of the past and maintain momentum on all key issues and parameters. Through the process, GCNI developed the Strategic Plan for the years 2015-2020 to provide new direction to the Global Compact movement in India.

Serving as a platform for networking, knowledge exchange, policy advocacy, cutting edge action research and 'glocal' alliances, GCNI also launched its new initiative-'Cross-Over Series: Towards Inclusive Learning and Enlightened Leadership' on 16<sup>th</sup> September 2014 in Bengaluru. The objectives of the Series are to promote exchange of innovative ideas and experiences and thereby build a broad-based perspective on addressing some of the key social and environmental challenges of our times. The Series is a platform that offers alternative public policy pathways besides intensifying our engagements with key stakeholders regionally. Six Cross-Over Series have been organised across five cities including Delhi, Chennai, Hyderabad, Mumbai and Chennai

To promote the agenda of Human Rights and Labour, GCNI collaborated with various organisations including SERFAC, Praxis, Aide-et-Action and Essar Foundation and facilitated discussion platforms on child rights and women empowerment. The constructive role played by GCNI in taking forward the UNGC mandate on Human Rights and Labour led to its representation in the Global Working Group on Human Rights and Labour. The Working Group comprises key stakeholders working to develop and refine tools and other guidance materials for business on how to respect and support human rights and seeks to identify and promote good business practices for the implementation of human rights.

Moving in tandem with the global development discourse, GCNI is working towards taking forward the UNGC Mandate on sustainability and sustainable development in India and is making concerted efforts towards initiating discussions and deliberations on the issue of sustainability as it has emerged as one of the major thematic areas for discussions to explore opportunities, challenges and plans for way forward. Moving in this direction, GCNI brought together key-stakeholders from industry, academics, civil society and thinks tanks and convened the Sustainability Alliance Partners' group for developing and formulating a plan of action on sustainability to be taken up, within the broad framework of the Global Compact Principles especially the principles relating to environment.

GCNI's anti-corruption initiatives witnessed a new surge of activities including programmatic interventions and research and publications. During the past year, Collective Action Project launched its final publication titled 'Business Case for Anticorruption in India: Principles, Economics and Applications of Transparency Tools' on 6th February 2015 in Mumbai. To celebrate the successful completion of one of its Anti-corruption project in India, GCNI also organised a conference on "Business Case for Anticorruption: Call for Collective Action" on 28th November, 2014 in New Delhi. The Conference shared the learnings and findings of the Collective Action Project (CAP) in the past four years and marked a way-forward by scaling up the Anti-corruption Collective Action Agenda through the launch of GCNI Center of Excellence for Transparency and Ethics in Business in India. GCNI and TRACE International also jointly organised a half day Anti- Bribery workshop on 5<sup>th</sup> November 2014 in New Delhi that focussed on the merits for businesses to be compliant.

In the last year, GCNI was represented in various international forums and conferences including the Annual Regional Meeting Asia/Oceania in Dhaka, Bangladesh; 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of adoption of UNGC's Principal 10 in New York, USA; Fourteenth meeting of the Global Compact Working Group on Anti-Corruption in Geneva, Switzerland and 12<sup>th</sup> Annual Local Network Meeting in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. GCNI has been an active participant at these forums and has contributed towards bringing together key stakeholders including the other local networks for building greater solidarity for the Global Compact movement in the world.

GCNI has expanded exponentially in terms of its influence, programmes, activities, and outreach in India as well as globally. It is with great pride and immense satisfaction, I announce that during the past year, GCNI was instrumental in leading a major research projects, through the Asia Pacific Resource Centre on Responsible Business Practices, with 8 other Local Networks in Asia including Bangladesh, China, Japan, Korea, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri-Lanka titled 'Regional Leadership Through UNGC Principles: Cases and Practices of Nine Local Networks in Asia'. The report was launched during the Annual Local Network Forum in Dhaka on 10<sup>th</sup> December 2014. GCNI also in fulfilling its commitment to support its peers across the world, supported the Kenya Local Network of the United Nations Global Compact in restructuring its governance structures and putting a new framework to effectively administer and govern its operations in a more planned and inclusive manner.

GCNI in order to share knowledge and take forward mutuallyreinforcing benefits of research, training and thought leadership, also opened up its membership to selected academic and educational institutions in India to recognise ongoing initiatives in the field of education and the role of academia through global alliances and associations to build and enhance the relevant curricula and student orientation. As a part of this initiative GCNI led the framing of the public policy curriculum for undergraduate and graduate course at Lucknow University.

While today we stand at the cross-roads between MDGs and the new global development architecture, it is an opportune moment for us all present here to reflect on what we have achieved together. Such reflection, I am sure would add greater value and strengthen this movement as we go forward.

GCNI has achieved much during the past year, and these learning would be built on for the future endeavours that we pursue. In the coming years, GCNI would work towards aligning its activities with the post 2015 global development agenda and develop itself as a thought leaders around Ten Universal Principles, Broad UN Goals, Special Initiative of the Secretary General, Sustainability and CSR. GCNI has already initiated activities to transform itself as a knowledge hub and the years forward would witness strengthening of this capacity for the benefit of members, patrons and partners. The partnerships and collaborations forged would be further strengthened and new opportunities would be explored for innovative interventions and initiatives for achieving the new development goals. Moving forward, GCNI would be playing an influential role in the global development discourse for galvanising action around responsible business practices and culture.

I gratefully acknowledge the support of my colleagues in the Governing Council whose support and expertise has been crucial in taking the Global Compact movement in India forward. I also acknowledge the support of our patrons and members who helped us organise various events. The GCNI Secretariat, led by its Executive Director has put-in commendable effort and deserves appreciation. I look forward to renewed commitment and effort from this team as we have an ambitious agenda to implement this year.

I thank you for your investing your time and resources in engaging with the Global Compact Initiative during the last year and look forward to your continued association with us in years to come. Your support and encouragement has been instrumental in ensuring the growth of GCNI in India and its increasing regard as a leading network amongst its peers globally.

Launch of Pune Chapter



The 5<sup>th</sup> Subir Raha Memorial Lecture was organised on the theme of "Good Corporate Governance" and was delivered by Dr. Anil Kakodkar, former Chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission and INAE Satish Dhawan Chair of Engineering Eminence on 10<sup>th</sup> March 2015 in New Delhi. In his lecture, Dr. Kakodkar discussed the notion of corporations acting as "good corporate citizens", and deliberated on the role of businesses to create wealth while promoting the prosperity of the community and its citizens. Furthermore, Dr. Kakodkar stated that in order to address the growing disparities between rural and urban India, attempts need to be made towards empowering education in the rural areas. Speaking on the urban areas in India, Dr. Kakodkar reiterated the importance of education as a step towards development and empowerment of society. Academic institutions, in addition to the industry, should engage in human development and societal issues, and in this aspect innovation is an important factor in transforming an idea into a positive developmental outcome. The event was attended by over 250 participants including Dinesh K. Sarraf, President, GCNI and Chairman & Managing Director, Oil and Natural Gas Corporation Limited; Dr. S.P.S. Can Business be Champion of 'Safe Childhood for Every Child?'

Global Compact Network India and Praxis organised the Cross-Over Series on the theme 'Can business be champion of 'Safe Childhood for Every Child?' on 19<sup>th</sup> January, 2015 in New Delhi. The programme centered on the Children's Rights and Business Principles developed jointly by UNICEF, United Nations Global Compact and Save the Children. for sound investments by corporate sector in children, which will impact the lives of millions living in urban and rural areas as well as to showcase the work of some thought and action leaders in the field. The event started with welcome remarks by Dr. Uddesh Kohli, Senior Advisor, UNGC, New York and Tom Thomas, CEO, Praxis and the agenda was set by Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, Global Compact Network India. The event showcased the movie 'Sach Yeh Kadve Hai', made by children living in slums. The event included a panel discussion on the theme of "Business & Social Responsibility promoting Safe-Childhood" comprising Dinesh Agrawal, General Manager (SDG), NTPC Limited; Murali Srinivas, Head, AFHTAC - A Habitat for Humanity India Social Enterprise; Pranjal Goswami, Head- Sustainability, Novozymes South Asia Private Limited and Abhishek Kumar, CSR Head, Samsung India. The panel was moderated by Sonia Shrivastava, CSR Head - South Asia, Intel. During the deliberations, the panelists highlighted the role of businesses in building an environment conducive for children and their development.

# Transforming Education through CSR

Global Compact Network India jointly with Aide-et-Action International organised the fourth edition of the Cross-Over Series in Chennai on 30<sup>th</sup> October 2014 on the theme of 'Transforming Education Through CSR'. The speakers and experts at the meeting included Srimathi Shivashankar, Associate Vice President, Diversity and Sustainability, HCL Tech; Dr. Catherine Bernard – Founder, SERFAC; Rajashree Natarajan,

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COO, Cognizant Foundation; Amruth. B.R Co-founder, CEO, Vita Beans & Guru-g Learning Labs and Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, Global Compact Network India. During the meeting, the panel deliberated on various strategies that could be adopted to ensure that children from all economic and social backgrounds have effective access to mainstream education. The panel also highlighted that the innovations around CSR initiatives are key to advance inclusion of communities and it is through these innovations that companies can play a vital role in transforming India.

#### How can CSR Transform the world? Invest to Educate the Excluded: Insights and Practices from India

The second edition of the 'Cross Over Series: Towards inclusive learning and enlightened leadership' was held on 18<sup>th</sup> September, 2014 in collaboration with Aide-et-Action International in New Delhi which was attended by over 100 participants. The discussions during the event revolved around the theme 'How can CSR transform the world? National Consultation on Strengthening Ethical Corporate Governance in Oil, Gas and Petrochemical Sector in India and Off-Shore

Global Compact Network India conducted a National Consultation on Strengthening Ethical Corporate Governance in Oil, Gas and Petrochemical Sector in India and Off-Shore on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 2015 in New Delhi. The Consultation was part of GCNI's anti-corruption project titled "Strengthening Ethical and Transparent Corporate Governance Practices and Further Responsible Development", supported by Foreign and Commonwealth Office's Prosperity Fund India Programme under the British High Commission. The event was marked by the launch of a White Paper on Strengthening Ethical Corporate Governance.

The Consultation was attended by representatives from onshore and off-Shore segments from various leading Oil and Gas companies of the country. This sector specific consultation was to better understand the existing compliance practices of oil and gas companies with a view to identifying ways in which oil and gas companies, operating out of India, can fully implement the Global Compact 10<sup>th</sup> Principle on Anti-Corruption. The consultation deliberations came up with recommendations from industry experts. Unravelling the Impact of International Debarments – Why Compliance on Anticorruption matters

To bridge awareness and knowledge gap on effective anticorruption and anti-fraud frameworks Global Compact Network India (GCNI) Secretariat in collaboration with Ernst & Young LLP (EY) organised a full day conference on "Unravelling the Impact of International Debarments - Why Compliance on Anticorruption matters" on 18th February, 2015 in Mumbai. The conference deliberated on the critical subject of sanctions and familiarise Indian companies and included topics such as the donor agency anti-corruption policies and the sanctions framework, procedures followed by the agencies to investigate fraud and corruption cases, importance of anti-fraud and corruption procedures within the companies to avoid sanctions and how large and mid-size companies should go about evaluating their corruption risks and put a program in place to address these risks responsibly. The experts at the event included Praveen Dixit, IPS, Director General, Anti-Corruption Bureau and other eminent speakers from World Bank, City and Industrial Development Corporation (CIDCO), Day Pitney LLP -US law firm and Siemens. Launch of "Business Case for Anticorruption in India: Principles, Economics and Applications of Transparency Tools"

Collective Action Project's final publication titled "Business Case for Anticorruption in India: Principles, Economics and Applications of Transparency Tools" was launched by Julio Ribeiro, Retd. IPS and Chairman, Public Concern for Governance Trust (PCGT) in a half day event on 6<sup>th</sup> February, 2015 at Mayfair Banquets, Mumbai. Around thirty representatives from public sector, private sector, academia and civil society were present at the book launch.

This book was the third and final publication of the Collective Action Project India completing the trilogy of books on anticorruption in India. The first book titled "Raising the Bar through Collective Action" captured the anti-graft policies practiced by 03/ Initiatives around UNGC Thematic Areas / Anti-Corruption

companies in India. The second book "Understanding the Demand and Supply Equations of Corruption and Fraud" analysed the fraud and bribery scenario in India over the last fifteen years as well as showcased good practices for maintaining ethical behaviour.

The final publication comprises case studies of business entities wherein practical experiences of investing in anticorruption procedure and processes is shared so that business could be graft free and financial dividends that aggregated steps have ensured for the business outfit. The publication is evidence of the journey of CAP India stakeholders since 2011 when the Project started. From a time when businesses were hesitant to speak to each other around transparency issues, to having the confidence to share the financial dividends that have accrued from transparency tools, it has been an interesting journey.

Conference on 'Business Case for Anticorruption: Call for Collective Action'

To celebrate the successful completion of Collective Action Project, Global Compact Network India held a conference on 28<sup>th</sup> November, 2014 at The Lalit, New Delhi titled "Business Case for Anticorruption: Call for Collective Action". The Conference shared the learnings and findings of the Collective Action Project (CAP) India over the past four years and was attended by business leaders from both public and private sector companies, as well as representatives from civil society.

Stakeholders shared challenges, dilemmas and importance of developing a Business Case for Anticorruption and linking transparency initiatives to profits. During the conference it was agreed that more concrete forms of organic Anticorruption Collective Action Initiatives need to emerge from India, and these initiatives have to be directly linked to business profits to be of serious reckoning. The Conference marked a way-forward by recommending the need to scale up the Anti-corruption Collective Action Agenda in India.

#### Anti- Bribery Workshop

Global Compact Network India Secretariat and TRACE International jointly organised a half day Anti- Bribery workshop on 5<sup>th</sup> November, 2014 at the Imperial Hotel in New Delhi. The focus of the Anti-Bribery workshop was to discuss the merit for businesses to be compliant. Some of the eminent speakers in the workshop were Eileen Radford, Director, Advisory Services, TRACE International; Parul Nanabhai, Ashok Pratap & Co. Barristers & Advocates; Priyanka Sharma Goswami, Partner, Dua Associates; Kumar Bantesh, Regional Head-Legal, ACC

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Limited; Pradnya Shinde, Regional, CSR Coordinator, Holcim Ltd. and Inder Mohan Singh, Director-Legal, Honeywell Automation India Ltd. The introductory session focused on some of the issues faced by multinational companies trying to establish their businesses in India. This session was followed by a session on 'Why Companies in India Must Strengthen their Compliance Programs', during which some of the good practices followed by companies to overcome graft and bribery were brought to the forefront. The companies which participated in this discussion were ACC Limited, Holcim Limited and Honeywell Automation India Ltd. This session was followed by an introductory session on 'How TRACE Tools and Services Can Help Companies Meet International Compliance Standards'. The event ended with a vote of thanks by Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, GCNI, who in his address spoke at length about the 'Role of UN Global Compact Network India in Anti-Corruption Efforts' and highlighted the initiatives being undertaken by Global Compact Network to take forward anticorruption in India. Ashok Kumar Pavadia, Adviser, Inter-State Council Secretariat & Additional Secretary, Ministry of Home Affairs, Government of India, in his closing address reiterated the importance of the Companies Act 2013 as a tool in anticorruption in India.

#### CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE (COE) FOR TRANSPARENCY AND ETHICS IN BUSINESS

Based on the learnings from the Collective Action Project India, the UN Global Compact India Network instituted the GCNI Centre of Excellence for Business and Transparency to scale up the Collective Action Agenda in India. The Project officially started functioning from 1<sup>st</sup> March 2015. Indian business practices a multitude of anticorruption initiatives in silos. COE encourages shared focus and provides a platform for greater coordination, thereby increasing the reach and impact of business initiatives.

#### Essentially the COE aims to

• Develop pragmatic approaches around UNGC Principle 10 to challenging business decisions.

• Provide enabling platform to businesses, policy makers, civil society, industry associations, UN agencies and academia, and

• Improve organisational decision making through a stakeholder management framework that integrates transparency and integrity.

GCNI Centre Of Excellence for Transparency and Ethics in Business is to be developed on a collaborative model, with new approaches and techniques, by engaging diverse range of stakeholders focusing on both supply and demand side of corruption.

The Centre is aimed to function as an integral part of GCNI and would focus on knowledge and information collection, storage, dissemination and exchange, in a simple but usable manner, for scale and impact. A virtual and integrated knowledge hub, the Centre would provide quality, credible and extensive knowledge support to the companies and organisations. It would also leverage resources from local, regional and global levels, aggregate and offer to companies and organisations in India, South Asia and Asia Pacific region.

The services provided by the Centre would focus around 4 pillars – diligence, advisory, training and knowledge support – and would include \_\_\_\_\_

- Sustainability reporting and related advisory services,
- CSR policy support on implementation and compliance,
- Training and Development initiatives,
- Evidence based research/surveys/data/tailor made reports, and
- Support Academic Institutions in embedding CSR and Sustainability in their curriculum and help them set up departments as needed.

The activities of the Centre are currently being implemented in three phases – Phase I - Pilot and Consolidation of Activities in India, currently on and would continue until December 2015, Phase II - Expansion of the Centre to addressing the demand from the South Asian Countries Networks and Phase III – Scaling the activities to include Global Compact Networks, Companies and Organisations in the Asia Pacific Region.

The Centre is currently focusing on pilots and consolidation of activities in India, which include cutting edge research, training and capacity building, support to academia and advisory services to members.

Collective Action on Corruption, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia

Shabnam Siddiqui, Project Director, CAP was invited to speak at the forum on Collective Action on Corruption: Gender Perspectives, which took place on 29<sup>th</sup> January 2015 at the UNECA Conference Center in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. Participants from the Ethiopian and African business community, government and civil society organisations came together at the event to share experiences regarding collective action initiatives and shed light on how to actively engage in the fight against corruption through gender inclusive policies and benefits of collective action to address this issue. Additionally, Global Compact India's upcoming publications on business case for anticorruption, shared at the event, highlighted the good practice examples of collective action from various parts of the world.

#### Global Compact Local Networks Regional Meeting Asia/Oceania, Dhaka, Bangladesh

The Global Compact Local Networks Regional Meeting Asia/Oceania was organised in Dhaka from 9<sup>th</sup> to 11<sup>th</sup> December 2014. The meeting was attended by representatives from 13 Local Networks - the largest attendance to date - from Australia, Bangladesh, China, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Maldives, Myanmar, Nepal, Republic of Korea, Singapore, Sri Lanka and Vietnam. The meeting also witnessed a Business and Human Rights training to support the networks in building their own capacity on the UN Global Compact approach to human rights and expectations of corporate participants, including how Global Compact human rights commitments relate to the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights. The meeting also witnessed the launch of GCNI's Asia Collaboration Project titled 'Regional Leadership Through UNGC Principles: Cases and Practices of Nine Local Networks in Asia' by Dr. Gowher Rizvi, International Affairs Adviser to the Prime Minister of Bangladesh, Dr. Atiur Rahman, Governor of Bangladesh Bank, H. E. Hanne Fugl Eskjær, Ambassador, Embassy of Denmark, Bangladesh, Farooq Sobhan, Former Deputy Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations and Representative, Global Compact Network Bangladesh, Walid Nagi, Head - Local Networks, UNGC, New York and Shahamin Zaman, Contact Person of Global Compact Network Bangladesh. Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, GCNI represented the organisation during the meeting and facilitated the launch event.

#### 10<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Adoption of UNGC's 10<sup>th</sup> Principle, New York, USA

Shabnam Siddiqui represented GCNI at the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary event of adoption of UNGC's 10<sup>th</sup> Principal held in New York on 10<sup>th</sup> December, 2014. The event provided an opportunity to reflect on the 10 years since the launch of the 10<sup>th</sup> Principle and envisioning of emerging innovative anti-corruption measures. More than 200 participants, primarily from business and investment, discussed topics including: anti-corruption efforts in emerging markets, the role of investors in incentivising good governance, corruption in the banking sector and the importance of collective action. Additionally, keynote speaker, Thuli Madonsela, Public Protector of South Africa, reflected on public-private partnerships in the fight against corruption.

The event revolved around five major objectives: celebrate achievements in the fight against corruption over the past 10 years and reinforce the business case against corruption; highlight emerging and innovative anti-corruption measures implemented by various stakeholders and explore different perspectives, including those from emerging markets; explore recent examples of collective action initiatives to eliminate corruption; share information and connect stakeholders working against corruption through the Anti-Corruption Information Fair; and embed good governance and anti-corruption into the global development agenda and goals for the post-2015 era to ensure future development efforts are not undermined by corruption

Siemens Integrity Conference on "Collective Action: Going Further Together to Counter Corruption", Basel, Switzerland

A two days Siemens Integrity Conference was organised in Basel, Switzerland between 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> June, 2014. Hailemariam Desalegn, Prime Minister of Ethiopia. The meeting also witnessed the launch of Global Compact Local Network Report 2013 and Africa Strategy titled, 'Partners in Change: UN Global Compact Advancing Corporate Sustainability in Africa'. During the conference UNGC recognised the critical role of Local Networks in advancing responsible business and corporate sustainability on the ground and also launched a number of countries networks including Canada, Guatemala and Kazakhstan. The United Nations Global Compact Local Network Report 2013 launched in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia during XIIth Annual Local Networks Forum, highlighted Global Compact Network India (GCNI) as a leader in the Asia and Oceania Region, by surging ahead of 18 other networks in the region on various performance related parameters including membership enrolment. Some of the Networks GCNI surged ahead of include; China, South Korea, Japan, Australia and Indonesia.

GCNI launches Asia Cooperation Project during the Asia/Oceania Local Network Regional meeting in Dhaka on 10<sup>th</sup> December, 2014

Global Compact Network India launched its Asia Collaboration Project titled 'Regional Leadership Through UNGC Principles: Cases and Practices of Nine Local Networks in Asia' during the Asia/Oceania Local Network Regional Meeting in Dhaka, Bangladesh on 10<sup>th</sup> December 2014. The project was launched in the presence of Dr. Gowher Rizvi, International Affairs Adviser to the Prime Minister of Bangladesh; Dr. Atiur Rahman, Governor of Bangladesh Bank; H. E. Hanne Fugl Eskjær, Ambassador, Embassy of Denmark, Bangladesh; Faroog Sobhan, Former Deputy Permanent Representative of Bangladesh to the United Nations and Representative, Global Compact Network Bangladesh; Walid Nagi, Head - Local Networks, UNGC, New York; Shahamin Zaman, Contact Person of Global Compact Network Bangladesh and Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, GCNI. Asia cooperation is the first unique exercise involving Local Networks of Asia namely of Bangladesh, China, India, Japan, Korea, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka capturing their past, present and future leadership through UNGC principles. The Asia cooperation has been implemented under GCNI's latest initiative 'Asia Pacific Resource Centre on Responsible Business Practices' and further efforts are currently ongoing at the Asia Pacific level, leveraging interface between businesses and Local Networks of strategic importance in the region

#### GCNI framed Public Policy Curriculum, Lucknow University to teach UNGC principles

GCNI developed an interdisciplinary curriculum for public policy programmes both at the undergraduate and post-graduate levels for Lucknow University, one of the oldest and leading universities in India, to strengthen public policy curriculum in the country and advance ten universally accepted principles of the United Nations Global Compact. These programmes aim at opening doors of public policy issues and concerns to the students who can subsequently learn and embrace value based practices and responsible conduct in transforming institutions that they would go on to serve in future. The public policy programmes both at the graduate and post graduate levels have been launched by the Lucknow University and have been well received, reflected by the enrolment rate across these two levels and continue to gain traction bringing businesses, academic, government and non-governmental organisations together on intersection of public policy and other disciplines of academic pursuits

# Strategic Engagement with Academic Institutions

In order to share knowledge and take forward mutuallyreinforcing benefits of research, training and thought leadership, GCNI during the year under consideration opened up its membership to select few academic and educational institutions in India. The objective was to recognise ongoing initiatives in the field of education and the role of academia through alliances and associations to build and enhance the relevant curricula and student orientation. Through collaboration with academic institutes, universities and business schools, GCNI aims to advance CSR and sustainability practices and integrate the global knowledge and expertise in the curriculum of these institutions. #### GCNI guides Kenya Local Network in its governance set-up

Global Compact Network India (GCNI), fulfilling its commitment to support its peers across the world, has supported the Kenya Local Network of the United Nations Global Compact in restructuring its governance structures and putting a new framework to effectively administer and govern its operations in a more planned and inclusive manner. In a meeting held between contact points of India and Kenya Networks during Annual Local Network Forum held in Addis in June 2014, GCNI agreed to guide the Kenva Network with its knowledge, experience and a well functional governance structure. India Local Network has been providing support to other local network across regions by sharing common areas of concerns, issues, challenges and opportunities about governance systems and effective structures that lead to Network's sustainability and generate more confidence among stakeholders by contributing to its functioning and long-term support.

#### GCNI represented at the Global Working Group on Human Rights and Labour

The constructive role played by GCNI in taking forward the UNGC mandate on Human Rights and Labour led to its representation at the Global Working Group on Human Rights and Labour. In May 2008, a Global Compact Labour Working Group was established under the auspices of the Global Compact Board. In 2013, in light of growing recognition that labour rights are human rights, the Global Compact Board decided to merge the Labour Working Group and the Human Rights Working Group. GCNI is represented by Pooran Chandra Pandey, Executive Director, GCNI. The Working Group has been active in developing and refining tools and other guidance materials for business on how to respect and support human rights and seeks to identify and promote good business practices for the implementation of human rights. Pooran Chandra Pandey as a part of the group also facilitated a session on 'Strengthening Implementation GC Human Rights and Labour Principles at the Local Level' during the meeting held in December 2014 in Geneva Switzerland.

#### **Cross-Over Series** launched in Bengaluru

Serving as a platform for networking, knowledge exchange, policy advocacy, cutting edge action research and 'glocal' alliances, Global Compact Network India (GCNI) launched its new initiative-'Cross-Over Series: Towards Inclusive Learning and Enlightened Leadership' on 16th September 2014 in Bengaluru. The objectives of the Series are to promote exchange of innovative ideas and experiences and thereby build a broadbased perspective on addressing some of the key social and environmental challenges of our times. The Series is proposed as a platform that will offer alternative public policy pathways besides intensifying our engagements with key stakeholders regionally.

#### Global Compact Network India facilitated social audit of ACC plants



Monthly Knowledge Sharing and Networking Meetings in New Delhi

#### October 2014

Tejinder Sandhu, Governance Manager, UNICEF ICO, shared statistics that showcase poor health and nutritional attainment and water and sanitation status in India. The second presentation was given by Chanakya Choudhary, Chief Resident Executive, Tata Steel who mentioned the development programmes being implemented by TATA Steel in Jamshedpur, Jharkhand.

#### May 2014

Global Compact Network India and Enduring Value Advisory and Practice jointly organised the Monthly Knowledge Sharing and Networking Meeting for the month of May on 23<sup>rd</sup> May, 2014 on the theme 'Sustainable Value Creation and Waste Management' to understand waste management scenarios in India. The objective of the meeting was to bring together stakeholders to share ideas, knowledge, best practices, and interventions on issues related to sustainable development in India, such as, waste management. The presentations were made by Sangeeta Robinson, Founder and Chief Executive Officer and Danish Khan, Head Operations from Enduring Value Advisory and Practice. The presenters emphasised on the importance of waste management. Presenters noted that treatment systems are different in India due to seasonal variation and waste characterisation with respect to waste management. For example, currently, certain forms of waste like e-waste, medical waste, and garbage need to go through the segregation process before being treated.

#### May 2014







# GCNI's Governance

The governance of the Global Compact Network India (GCNI) is led by a Governing Council elected every two years by the General Body, supreme body of the GCNI's governance structure, consisting of GCNI's members. The Governing Council members include President, Vice Presidents representing four regions (North, South, East, West), Treasurer, Secretary, executive members, co-opted members and special invitees. The Governing Council is mandated to execute the general policies of the Network in conformity with the objects of the MOU, pass and deliberate on organisational resolutions, appoint Chief Executive and determine their power and responsibilities, constitute committees and delegate powers and manage finances. The Governing Council meets in practice once every four months, in a meeting convened by the Secretary.

To support and facilitate the Governing Council there is an Administration Committee. The Administration Committee guides the Secretariat on functional matters and supports it to carry out the Global Compact's mandate in India. The Administration Committee in general meets six times a year or as the need may be to discuss and deliberate on matters affecting the efficiency and effectiveness of the Secretariat and evaluate its work and guide.

To provide the Secretariat with support and guidance, dedicated sub-committees have been constituted on key areas of interventions. These committees, constituted of Global Compact Network India's member organisations and experts, work on key areas of concern, premised on the UNGC principles.

The Secretariat also in its day to day operations is supported and guided by an Operations Committee. The Committee in practice meets whenever matters seeking immediate resolution are brought up by the Secretariat.

To further the Global Compact and carry forward the Global Compact's mandate on the day to day functioning, the Global Compact Network India is supported by a Secretariat headed by an Executive Director. The Secretariat during the period under consideration had the following members;
