

The 20th Anniversary of the UN Global Compact Principle Ten

Date: Monday, 23 September 2024 | 15:30 – 19:30 **Location:** 620 Loft & Garden, Rockefeller Center, NY

Context

On the occasion of the 20th Anniversary of Principle Ten, the UN Global Compact will host a special event to celebrate with leaders of the business community, Governments, international organizations, academia and civil society who helped define the international anti-corruption agenda over the last decades. A high-level networking opportunity with interactive discussions will be structured around taking stock of past achievements, examining current priorities, and debating on the future of business integrity.

The theme will tell the story of how Principle Ten came to existence to complement the other UN Global Compact Principles; it will recall the accomplishments and impact of the former Anti-Corruption Working Group of the UN Global Compact; while offering a journey to commemorate fifteen years of Collective Action implemented by its Country Networks around the world.

From a past to present narrative, the event will also highlight results from recent initiatives such as the Call-to-Action from Business to Governments on the 20th Anniversary of the UN Convention against Corruption (UNCAC); the first Private Sector Forum at a Conference of the States Parties (CoSP) to UNCAC co-hosted with the UN Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC); and the response received by Governments through the adoption of a CoSP resolution on incentives for the prevention of corruption in the private sector. Reflections will determine how to translate these milestones into practice today, leveraging G20 and B20 alignment, together with other regional and national platforms.

In particular, thematic areas identified as critical to level the playing field will be emphasized, such as: corporate sustainability criteria in government decision-making processes; artificial intelligence governance, along with information and communication technology (ICT) to manage corruption risks while strengthening oversight; and ethical leadership principles in education to ensure the commitment of future business leaders to standards of fairness and integrity in the workplace of tomorrow.

To that end, participants will explore how corporate anti-corruption efforts have evolved and expanded to address broader integrity challenges, raising the bar for companies to not only be more accountable, ethical, and transparent, but to also be inclusive, sustainable and act as responsible corporate citizens, contributing to strengthening public institutions, laws and systems where they operate. In this context, the UN Global Compact Transformational Governance approach will get the spotlight.



More importantly, discussions will help shape a new global business integrity agenda considering rising obstacles, new trends, innovative solutions, and priorities in the field of governance and anti-corruption.
